

# Lulu Creek - The 4-Tusked Elephant

Through the first years of digging at Lulu Creek, I found mostly marine material: sharks teeth from various species, fish mouthplates, barracuda teeth, dolphin teeth, etc. Land mammal material was, and still is, very rare at Winter Garden. In fact, what I've found of land mammal would fit into a butter dish...... with one exception. Strangely, Proboscidean material showed up more often than anything else.

We'd find small thumb-sized pieces of enameled teeth. One trip I found a small fist-sized piece. It was strange, had many cuspids, was wrinkled, and unlike anything I'd seen. When I had first heard about an elephant having four tusks, I thought someone was pulling my leg. After reading up on it with my growing collection of books on Paleontology, I also learned about shovel-tusked elephants, the mammoths, and the mastodons. I never dreamed of elephants living here in Florida, let alone that there were a dozen different kinds. Just shows that you're never too old to learn something new. About a year later, both Mike Trapp and Dave Dunaway had found partial tooth pieces. Mike gave his to Dave because they fit together. Another year passed before I found the final end piece of that tooth. And when Dave gave me the other two pieces, I had my first Gomphotherium tooth. Continued on page 6

Gomphothere was an elephant that lived in what would be Winter Garden millions of years ago. These mid-sized Proboscideans had two

tusks in their upper jaw and two in the lower jaw.

The teeth evolved for eating a variety of plants....mostly the softer kinds. These, along with the other species of elephant, went extinct here about 11,000 years ago.

One morning, not long after Mike & were down in Lulu, wading through a section about 50 ft. long and waist deep. Past that was a large gravel bar with a railroad beam laying in front of it. Last time we were there, Jeremy had found 17 big tiger shark teeth around the beam. Mike & I had set down our gear on some elephant ear leaves we had cut down. Picking up my shovel from where I had stuck it into the ground to hang my screen, I saw it. It was brownish in color and potato chip thin. I had found my first point or arrowhead. Like when I found my first shark tooth and only then realized that sharks swam where we walk, I just had never given much thought to where

Holding it up to the sun, I could see though it... like glass. As I've dug the years away, it is still my best point. Studying up on it, I discovered that the Timucua were a large group of Indians that lived throughout Mid-Florida as early as 7,000 years ago. Point styles plus pottery found, date this area from 4,000 to 500 years ago. Thousands of early Americans lived here for thousands of years until the arrival of the European explorers.

Indians had lived.... until I held that point.


Thanks to Lulu Creek, my fossil collection was growing with each trip. And my shark jaw collection was spreading across a


whole wall. I feverishly worked on my report to the State for my first fossil permit. Yes, sir, things were looking up until....




We also desperately need volunteers for security for Friday night and Saturday night. This is one time that being big and/ or scary is a real plus!
